Soay Characteristics

Animal:

- Small sized primitive breed
- · Intelligent, hardy and agile
- · Low maintenance, thrive on marginal pasture
- Rams: average weight 36kgs (80lbs)
- Ewes: average weight 20-23kgs (45-50lbs)
- Rams are horned with various configurations
- · Ewes may be horned or polled
- Both sexes may be scurred (exhibiting small undeveloped horns)
- · Short tail
- Excellent mothers with ease of lambing

Wool:

Fleece colour is predominantly brown, tan or chocolate with light markings on the underbelly and rump, over the eyes, and under the jaw. Self coloured animals occur in tans and browns with occasional blacks. Some white spotted animals also occur. No wool on face or legs. Sheds fleece naturally under normal breeding conditions.

Meat:

Full flavoured meat that is low in cholesterol and fat. Cooking methods must take into account lack of fat.

Status:

Rare Breeds Survival Trust UK, 2009 Watchlist, category 4, At Risk, less than 1500 registered breeding ewes.

Boreray Characteristics

Animal:

- · Small sized primitive breed
- Intelligent, hardy and agile
- · Low maintenance, thrive on marginal pasture
- · Rams: average weight 45kgs (100lbs)
- Ewes: average weight 25-30kgs (55-66lbs)
- · Rams have large spiraled horns
- · Ewes are generally horned, occasionally polled
- Short tai
- · Excellent mothers with ease of lambing

Wool:

Fleece colour is mainly pale grey, tan or creamy white, often with a dark collar around the neck and dark rump patch. A few dark animals occur. No wool on face or lower legs - colouring is black, tan or grey with frequent black, tan or speckled markings. Sheds fleece naturally under normal breeding conditions.

Meat:

Full flavoured tender meat that is low in cholesterol.

Status:

Rare Breeds Survival Trust UK, 2009 Watchlist, category 1, Critical, less than 300 registered breeding ewes.



The Soay Sheep Society was founded in 2000 by a group of Soay owners realising the need for a representative body to speak and act on behalf of Soay sheep. In 2003 the Society decided to include Boreray sheep due to their close geographical link to the Soay.

The Society aims to assist new Soay and Boreray enthusiasts with welfare and management regimes, educate other people about their particular characteristics, and help each other with problems if and when they arise. We produce a regular newsletter, and act as a go between when new blood is needed in a flock, helping with ram exchanges and sales.
